

SOLARNET Public Engagement workshop

Outline for participants

This workshop will introduce the range of opportunities through which public engagement can occur, and some of the key issues, with a particular emphasis on working with schools.

- Why do we want to 'engage the public with science?'
- Designing for evaluation, pathways to impact, and writing engagement into research bids.
- Contexts & approaches: the range of opportunities available for science communication.
- How to talk to people. Understanding your audience, and the 'communication' part of 'science communication'.
- Unconscious bias: implications and mitigations.
- Empty vessels to science capital and co-creation: developments and trends within public engagement.
- Understanding the needs of teachers, structuring activities for classroom use, and how to engage young people.

The concepts and approaches we explore will be applicable in a wide range of engagement contexts, however we expect the workshop will spark the development of new classroom activities.

Participants should expect to be active participants throughout, with a range of exercises and discussions requiring their presence with camera and microphone turned on.

The format for the workshop will be an online event, and content has been arranged such that it will run over a 2-day period (12-13 April). We aim to have live discussions as well as asynchronous exercises.

SOLARNET Online Workshop Code of Conduct

- In large groups, use the 'raise hand' feature of the video conferencing platform to show that you want to speak.
- You can use the chat function to ask questions, make comments and share appropriate links with others.
